
in the first place. Ms Cristy Hempel also took a positive step forward by successfully graduating with her B.Ed degree with Distinction.

SGB CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

n behalf of the School Governing Body, I am humbled to present the 2023 Annual Report. It has been a privilege and pleasure to dedicate our time and expertise in serving Clarendon High School for Girls as Governors. For some of us, our term of office comes to an end now, with our daughters writing Matric this year.

The inception of the current SGB was when the school was dealing with the recovery and unprecedented challenges of a global pandemic and institutional changes. The SGB was elected in 2021 for a term of three years as a statutory body of parents, educators, non-teaching staff and learners who seek to work together to promote the wellbeing and effectiveness of the school community and thereby enhance learning and teaching. The work done by the SGB aims to protect the rights of children in schools by facilitating the fair implementation of school rules. The SBG focused on the development and implementation of policies to protect and

learners in respect of school discipline, school fees, language, religion and culture.

The effectiveness of the SGB is measured with the standardised SGB Functionality Tool, and we are proud to report an independent score of 98% achieved for all the responsibility assigned to us.

The SGB Constitution was updated at the beginning of the term of office, in consultation with all members, and it was duly signed off according to the South African Schools Act. No 84 of

The composition and members of the SGB follows the SA Schools Act with all relevant stakeholders and relevant portfolios being established and operational. The Representative Council of Learners' (RCL) members are annually elected by their peers and join the SGB. The mandatory quarterly SGB meetings were held over with complete minutes and a decisions' register being maintained. In respect of the decisions register, all the SGB resolutions have been implemented and completed. The following SGB sub-committees

ability led by Mr van Heerden and supported by the newly appointed Financial Manager. During the year, monthly meetings have been held to review both the school and hostel financial position. The Audited Annual Financial Statement for the previous financial year indicates an unqualified audit opinion which confirms the high level of financial management and good governance systems. The school budget for the new 2024 academic year was approved by the parents on 27th September

2023, and the Fees Policy was

released accordingly. **Legal matters** were under the guidance of Advocate Fanana-Mtumane. This committee expedited the review and development of the school's policies. It was imperative that the policies were adapted to be relevant to the current needs of the school community and it was widely consulted with all the stakeholders. The committee work included disciplinary matters for staff and learners, engagement with parents, advice on contracts and policy reviews.

It is important that we create a professional environment and therefore we complied with the minimum professional qualifications for all educators. This is enhanced with continuous education and training of staff in the various subject-curriculum engagement, staff and pupil welfare matters. It is important to focus on the Staff to have a run-on effect on institutional stability and changes. The recognition of all staff members has been incorporated into the annual programme of the school. The Annual Awards Ceremony recognises the commitment and contribution of staff to the vision of the school.
















OPENING OF THE HARRISON AQUATIC CENTRE

Joan Harrison did the impossible. Will you?

oday is a proud day for the Clarendon family. We officially open our brand, new Harrison Aquatic Centre, a Centre that will afford not only our very own Clarendon girls many opportunities, but even learners and sports men and women from within the greater East London area and beyond, will have an opportunity to benefit from the use of this beautiful amenity.

The beginnings of this facility began as a dream and a vision, and so what I thought to do today, was to quite appropriately talk you through the story and the realised

Close to two years later, at the Commonwealth Games in Canada. Joan went on to win two Gold medals, a Silver and a Bronze, before retiring at the ripe old age of 17. She was South Africa's supreme swimmer

ambitions of our very 'own' internationally renowned swimmer, Joan Harrison (now Breetzke).

Born in East London, in 1935, of a swimming mother and a rugby-playing father, Joan Harrison wasted little time taking advantage of her sporting heritage. At 13, she already held three Junior and two Senior national records. In 1950, at the age of 14, she competed in her first international competition the Commonwealth Games in Auckland, New Zealand - beating the old record by 13 seconds, to finish first in the 400m Freestyle event. She was declared the most outstanding swimmer in the Games.

But it was in her second international event - at the Helsinki Olympics in 1952, that her name went down in the history books, distinguishing herself as the first South African Gold Medalist for swimming.

When we consider the life of Joan Harrison, and her outstanding achievements and contributions in swimming, it's important to understand that accomplishments such as these, do not come without a cost and without a number of key contributors, some of which I'd like to touch on today.

Joan shared in one of her interviews, that she would practise for hours in the seawater Quanza Swimming Pool at the Orient Beach. Despite the chill of winter, she persevered and would get home cold. She braved what was needed through the coldest of seasons and stayed motivated and determined, despite the discomfort. What can we learn from this? That it's grit we need in order to push though; that despite facing setbacks and challenges, passion and resilience is what will take us through our adversity to ultimately achieving our dreams; resilience means staying committed and bouncing back after mistakes; it means if you face a challenge, don't let it stop vou.

Joan's victory in the 100m Backstroke at Helsinki was a surprise to the whole swimming world. She even said herself. that she didn't expect a first place. However, she knew her strengths and she focused on the good. She stayed committed and the reward for her hard work was greater than she could ever have imagined. There is encouragement to us in her story never to give up on our dreams: spend time visualizing what you want



for the future, and how you plan on getting there; use your imagination and see yourself achieving what it is you want. This will be like a compass to you, guiding you and opening up doors that you didn't dream possible.

There is of course something unique around Joan's story - the truth that she was the only female swimmer representing South Africa that year in Helsinki. She was a true trailblazer, setting a remarkable example for aspiring female athletes to follow. But how can we make this relevant to us today; to every girl sitting here within the sound of my voice? Understand that each of you has unique talents and abilities; as well as intellectual and creative capacities that may lie dormant unless you aspire to becoming great. This greatness doesn't need to look like Joan's did. It will have your name written on it. It will be the story that you leave behind - the mark that you imprint on the world – the impact that you create.

To be a trailblazer, you'll need to possess a unique blend of vision, courage and determination. You'll need to be innovative in a way that doesn't compromise who you are. It'll demand resilience, passion and commitment to inspire change. Often you might stand alone as you embark on unchartered territories.

Joan went to the Olympics preparing to do her best but never expecting to win. I'm suggesting you remember her story as you use this facility in the days ahead. May it be a reminder, that you in fact, have what is needed to leave your very own mark in this world. Yes, Joan Harrison went on to leave her foot and handprints in cement, after being inducted into the International Swimming Hall of Fame. But each of you possesses a unique power within you, a remarkable potential to leave a legacy that will reflect your strength and your compassion. Every action and every choice you make whether it be in your studies. your passions, your sport, or the causes you believe in - is an opportunity to help shape your own destiny and inspire others. Embrace all challenges as stepping stones to your success, and do the impossible. Good Luck Girls! #FullSteamAhead







true Clarendon style,


we rose to

them to become involved, with the being. We held an interaction with


"Make your Mark" key rings as mementos of their orientation period.





n 2023, we once again saw Tourism growing in numbers and popularity as a school subject at Clarendon. With the retirement of Mr E Deutschmann at the end of 2021, Clarendon experienced the loss of a truly great and inspiring Tourism teacher. I am most grateful to him for all his assistance, guidance and mentorship during 2022 and 2023.

A very sincere congratulations must be extended to the Matric class of 2022 who acquitted themselves very well in their final exams. 19 girls wrote, with 9 girls achieving distinctions. This meant that 47% of the class gained A-aggregates. This was a phenomenal achievement, if one remembers that these pupils were the ones who were most affected by COVID-19 in their Grade 10 and 11 years. The whole class's performance made them the top performing school in the Eastern Cape for Tourism.

Tourism is an everchanging service industry which places huge focus on staying relevant in relation to world events while still being sustainable as a source of income to many in our country, as well as the rest of the world. This requires responsible action from all sectors of the industry. COVID-19 has obviously made a huge impact on travel, whether it be domestic, regional or international, and the GDP of many countries has been seriously affected by the travel restrictions that were put in place.

All three grades completed their PAT exams in the third term, which were 8 hours in length and took place over two days. The girls really acquitted themselves well and a large number of students achieved marks in the 80 – 90% range. These tasks require students to do various activities using the information provided in Case Studies and Scenarios and then use the information and data provided in a mediated Resource booklet to plan and resolve Tourism-



related issues. The girls have also completed a number of activities throughout the year, as well as Common Tests which are set by the Department of Education.

As we draw to the close of the year, we are busy completing the syllabus in each grade. The final assessments will take place in the form of a 3-hour Theory exam. We wish the students well for the last part of their year of

CANCEL CULTURE: COMBATING AND CHALLENGING OBTUSE SOCIAL **VIEWS OR CREATING ECHO CHAMBERS?**

In a social landscape where society is looking for change and development, it is imperative that society creates safe spaces for marginalized peoples. A realm which blazes the trail for social change is the social media realm. It is a space which provides for widespread interaction with ideals and with each other. However, it has also become an avenue for those with bigoted outlooks on society to spew obtuse views. All of this makes it necessary for society to find mechanisms to hold perpetrators of bigoted statements accountable. Society has settled on the *cancel culture* phenomena to fulfil this function.

The criteria which *cancel culture* must live up to, in order to be viewed as 'positive', is its efficacy in combating dangerous social issues or its allowance for society to do so. Cancel cultures, as a social phenomenon. is characterised by its greatest benefit, which is to 'de-platform' bigoted influencers, and the sense of accountability society is convinced it instils. Both of these benefits, however, are temporarily achieved – if at all

However, month-in and month-out, social media users witness the downfall of a 'problematic' celebrity. The efficacy and consistency of this social phenomenon can be brought into question. The truth about cancel culture is that it has an untouchable elite. These people have enough money either to

sway or evade the court of public opinion. The mere fact that cancel culture or 'being cancelled' can be avoided by megastars, who have the greatest influence and impact on society, renders this social phenomenon ineffective in achieving its objectives of accountability for one's actions.

Cancel culture is also driven by and encourages a herd mentality in its application. Social Media users are subjected to a false dichotomy where they must either completely shun someone from society or be viewed as being in direct support of politically incorrect social views. This is then unfair, as it carries dangerous implications on people's rights to autonomy and agency.

Even if cancel culture were to be perfect in its application, its principle flaws would disqualify it as a mechanism to hold people accountable. In order for society to achieve its desired progression, in terms of protecting the rights of marginalised people, constructive discourse needs to take place. The sole purpose of cancel culture does not go past removing negative influencers' platforms to change their mind-sets. Cancel culture can, because


of this, not drive or allow the combating of social issues.

Discourse allows society to challenge its bigotry and unconscious biases. This creates better prospects for social and systemic change due to its 'trickle-up' effect. Cancel culture, however, holds no true positive contribution to society by its creation of echo chambers, and the numerous problem-solution gaps which exist within it.

This year we were able to resume visitations with groups, visiting Breath of Life as well as the Lynette Elliott Frail Care.



We decided to put on a Broadway musical in the Guild Theatre to celebrate Clarendon's 120th year – this had not been done by our school since 2003! We chose "Sister Act!" and the cast, band and staff directors worked tirelessly to put on a show of entertainment and excellence. They certainly wowed the EL audiences and the reviews were very complimentary. The story line and music was wonderful and, if you missed it, you missed out. Mr Nel was our Guest of Honour at the Friday night show and it was a pleasure to have him in our midst and honour him as a former Principal. He remains committed to our school in his role as Chairman of the Clarendon Trust and we thank him for the work he does in this role. Sister Act! certainly showcased our very talented Music, Drama and Visual Arts departments at our school. It is wonderful that Old Girl Joy Sparg has joined the Music Department in her second year of teaching. We now have nine Old Girls as educators on our staff.

My next highlight was our 120th Founders' Day celebration on Friday 4 August 2023. We welcomed many reunion groups, especially Ms Liz Winkelman, Head Girl and former Deputy Principal, who celebrated her Matric Class' 60th reunion. We were treated to two inspiring addresses by our Co-Guests of Honour: Mrs Brenda Möhr (née Mills) (Head Girl from 1973) and Ms Caitlin Laing (Head Girl from 2018). This combination of speakers from the 50- and 5-year Old Girls' groups was well received by all as we celebrated our past, present and future. My third highlight was the Clarasel 200km Run. Our family of five schools, along with Sport for Lives, collaborated on a project to raise funds to build a literacy centre at Nonsikelelo Primary School in Mdantsane.

This initiative spoke closely to Clarendon High School's tradition of community spirit and the importance of functional literacy.

Another personal highlight, was when a Grade 8 ran the 100m at our Inter-house Athletics day, despite being U15 and very anxious and nervous to try.

In first place, in terms of highlights, is the opening of the Harrison Aquatic Centre – a state-of-the-art FINA-accredited Aquatic Centre and Learn to Swim pool. This is the reality of a dream started in Miss Rose's time. Having Mrs Joan Harrison Breetzke with us at the Opening Ceremony last week was very special. Not only was she an Olympic Gold Medallist and member of the International Swimming Hall of Fame, but she is renowned for her sportsmanship, lack of arrogance and calm demeanour as she approached her races. Making this event extra special, was having Ms Winkelman present, Head Girl from 1963, who was also present when Joan opened our Swimming Bath. We look forward to Noncedo Combined School Grade 4s starting the *Learn-to-Swim* programme this month.

A highlight for our school as a whole, is always the release of the Matric results, and the Class of 2022 did not disappoint, with 100% pass rate, this now for the 29th time, in a 30-year-period.

We had the first-placed learner in the BCM District, Anna Lukose, whose results were outstanding - she obtained an Aggregate of 94.1%. Three Matrics had aggregates of more than 90%; 23 Matrics had aggregates between 80-90%; there were 50 B aggregates. In fact, 89% of the class achieved 60% aggregate or above. There were 312 Subject distinctions and the Grade average was 72%. 95.4% of our candidates (or 125 out of 131 candidates) achieved Bachelor Passes, which allows these pupils to apply to Universities.

As a school we prioritise

every learner, from the top candidate to those lower down. Two of the Class of 2022. not the bottom of the class by any means, had approved concessions or accommodations from the Education Department. Our Imbokotho Facility and Concession System helped these two reach their full potential. This system is a software program that reads to the student who has qualified for a reader, and we have approval from the National Education Department to run this program - we are one of a handful of schools around the country that offer this reading software, thus proving we do care for every learner.

We are grateful to our highly-qualified and dedicated teachers who, through much hard work, assist our girls to achieve these results. At the BCM District Awards Ceremony, we received two Trophies – *Top Performing*, and *Best Performing High School* in the BCM district.

23 of our staff were awarded *Top Educator in the District* awards as their subjects placed first in the BCM District in the 2022 NSC examinations.

These subjects were as follows: Computer Applications Technology, Consumer Studies, English Home Language, History, Life Orientation, Life Sciences, Mathematics and Physical Sciences.

Out of 19 subjects, 7 Subjects' averages were between 70 - 79%. Three subjects had above 80% aggregates. All other 9 Subjects' averages were above 63.5 %.

At the MEC's Best
Performance Awards Ceremony
in May, Clarendon was proud to
receive the award for the school
in the Eastern Cape with the
TOP % BACHELOR PASSES (of
Quintile 5 schools) for the 2022
NSC Grade 12 results.

On the Grade 8 and 9 front, we were very pleased when a Grade 8 Maths team, consisting of Kajal Rama, Morgan Hartwig, Linomtha Nondabula and Madison Gale, won the *EL*

Maths Mania Competition, pipping the Grade 9 team and 14 other teams to win the Trophy.

The collective efforts and care our Staff show for our girls, contributes to these results and approach to learning, and I wish to thank all staff who have made 2023 a year of progress, achievement and hope.

From our newest teachers, in their first teaching posts; to our Deputy-Principal, Mr Herman; our Heads of Academics, Mrs Lottering and Mrs del Fava, other SMT members Mesdames Howarth, Nel, McCoy, Kobus, to our older staff stalwarts, our Grade Tutors, Class Teachers and Subject Heads, I salute and thank you all.

On a sad note, we bid farewell to Ms Wood, Ms Knott, Mrs Howarth and Mrs Wetmore. Mrs Wetmore leaves Clarendon after 32 years of dedicated service in the Consumer Studies Department and 16 years as an SMT member. We wish her well in her retirement.

Our Estate Manager, Mr Puchert and his Staff, especially Mr Fani who has 37 years of service to Clarendon, my Personal Assistant, Mrs Slabber, our front office staff, Mrs Renton and Mrs Newcombe, our Financial Manager, Mrs Naidoo and her assistants Mrs Kieck and Mr Moyake, Mrs Whittal and her Hostel staff, are all important cogs in this wheel of success, as they ensure an environment which is conducive to learning and teaching, and we thank them for their efforts.

Thank you Mrs
Sedras, Chairman of
the Governing Body, Mr
van Heerden, Fincomm
Chairman and the entire
Governing Body for the
enormous contribution made
to Clarendon over the past

year. Special mention is made of Grade 12 Parents who will exit our SGB at the end of this year: Mrs Sedras, Mr van Heerden, Mrs Mnyaiza and Mrs Fanana-Mtumane. They have worked tirelessly during their term of office in the best interests of our learners and the smooth operation of our school. I would also like to single out Dr Bedser, who left the SGB after the completion of the new Aquatic Centre. His service to our school and this project, has been exemplary and his wisdom, commitment and professional approach, is much appreciated The following successful projects have been completed by this dynamic team: Harrison Aquatic Centre, the Parking area at the Astro, the girls' undercover waiting area, upgrades to the girls' bathrooms, revamps of the Life Sciences classroom and a start has been made on standardisation of classrooms. In terms of policy updates, the work of the SGB has been immense. These updated policies help staff and learners feel respected and included.














two group dances and being placed third in each. We loved watching their group skills at our Variety concert and Inter-house plays.

Special thanks go to our 1st Team Sports Coaches: Athletics and Cross Country: Mrs Swart; Chess: Mr Vermaak; Hockey: Mr Nel; Netball: Mrs Langfield; Rowing: Mr Godfrey; Soccer: Mr Isobar and Mr van der Bvl: Squash: Mr Shean: Tennis: Mr Grotjohn; Water Polo: Ms Muller for their commitment to Sport at Clarendon. We thank ITEC for their generous sponsorship of all 1st Team sports kit.

Water Polo had a

busy and successful season. Highlights include our participation in the Merrifield pre-season Festival, where our 2nd Team came third, and our 1st Team ended in second place. The 1st team participated in the Brian Baker Festival ending in 9th place and won the Bowl Final at the Old Petrians Tournament. Our strong 2nd team was unbeaten at the Oakhill U19 Water Polo Festival in Knysna and placed second at the Friendship Cup, both times playing against other 1st teams; and our U14A Team placed third overall at the Jason Murray Tournament; our U15A team won the Friendship Cup and placed 7th at the Shaun Fuchs Crawfords Festival. Our U15B team played in the Oakhill Festival. We are excited to host the inaugural Harrison 2nd Team Water Polo Festival next Saturday.

Swimming – 8 swimmers represented Buffalo City Aquatics team. Kayla Gous, Emily Palmer and Holley Jacoby qualified for Junior Nationals. Tori Voke is No. 1 in her age group for 50 m freestyle - 17-year-old, qualified for Senior Nationals. and is ranked in the Top 20 in the Women's Category in this event. At our Interhouse Gala, the Junior Victrix Ludorum was won by Kayla Gouws, and Tori Voke won the Senior Victrix Ludorum and Most Outstanding Swimmer Award. 27 girls and 6 staff participated in a Swimathon in aid of the Carel du Toit centre.

The Highlight for our Aquatics team was the National All Girls' Aquatics Festival, held in Johannesburg. Our Swimming team was placed 6th overall, with Kayla Gous and Tori Voke missing out on the Dash for Cash 50m Freestyle events due

to lightning. Our 1st Water Polo team lost in the final to St Stithians, taking the Silver Medal.

Tennis – our 1st Team won the Merrifield Tournament and were second in the Selborne/ Clarendon Mixed Doubles event. We were well-represented at IPT teams, with Erin Peters, Mia van Aardt and Paige Gulle in the Aloes team; Sam Jordan in the Synergy A team, and Georgina do Rego in the Synergy B team We placed fourth in the Tjaart Vorster Tournament and fourth at the National All Girls' Festival. We congratulate Erin Peters on her selection to the SA Schools' Tennis team, which toured the UK in June/July. The season ended with the team being placed second at the Sentraal Tournament held in Bloemfontein.

Squash has a good group of social players and our Top 12 strive for National Rankings. Our 1st Team was unbeaten at the Dave Hodgson Festival in Makhanda and the Top 4 girls were unbeaten at the National All Girls' Sport and Cultural Festival, winning the Gold Medal. Clarendon dominated in Border Squash teams with 11 players representing their province. The 1st Team came fourth at the National Top Schools' Tournament. Cara Knott and Sasha Earl played in the SA National U17 Championships at the V&A Waterfront on an all- glass court and ended third and sixth respectively. National rankings were achieved after the IPT's, SA Closed and Bloemfontein Open, as follows: U16 Cara Knott (4), Sasha Earl (7); U14 Holly McClure (Top 10). Cara was selected for the SA Schools' U16 team to tour Malaysia and Singapore in the December holidays.

The National All Girls' Sport and Cultural Festival is the winter highlight and was definitely so, as it was hosted in 2023 for the first time since 2019.

The <u>Hockey</u> team had prepared well for this event, with their participation in the Greg Beling Festival and St Mary's

(Waverley) Festival, and was placed fourth out of 21 teams. The winter season is always filled with Derby Days and much spirit, and we congratulate the Cheerleaders on a job well done. U16 Hockey and Netball teams started the winter season participating in the St Mary's DSG (Kloof) Tournament, with Hockey being placed fifth out of 10 teams, and Netball sixth out of 22 teams. The 2nd Hockey Team played in the Grens and Union High 1st Team Festivals and our U14 team played in the Rob Taylor Festival. In June, the U14 Hockey and Netball teams travelled to the DSG Festival, with Hockey ending third and Netball second.

23 girls represented
Amathole Hockey teams and
we make special mention of two
of our matrics: Kaylin Hendriks
was selected to the SA U18A
Team, which participated in
matches against Free State and
SA u21; Kate van Heerden was
selected to the SA U18B team.
To conclude the Hockey season,
our 1st Team took part in the
Challengers Cup, hosted in Paarl,
and was placed fourth.

Netball teams started the season at the Grens Festival. The 1st Team were placed sixteenth at the National All Girls' Festival, with some very close matches which did not go our way. We congratulate Ikhona Ntutu, Aneliswa Sokujika (U16) and Jordan James (U18), on their selection to Eastern Cape Netball teams. Our 1st Netball Team participated in the Collegiate Festival at the end of the June holidays, and were placed fourth.

Athletes Inga Makhoba,
Aimee Pretorius, Leila Shenk,
Hannah James, Shavna Marimo
and Ikhona Ntutu all showed
determination and commitment
in the season, with the last
four girls selected to the BCM
Team to participate at Eastern
Cape Champs. Our Athletics
Victrix Ludorum winner, for the
second consecutive year was
sportswoman extraordinaire, 1st
Team Hockey and Water Polo
player and Lifesaver, Jenna Tarr.

In Cross Country, Leila
Schenk, Kate Booyens, Jessica
Lloyd and Saskia Dreyer
participated at All Girls' Festival.
The highlight was Leila's second
place in the Junior 4km event.
Leila placed 25th overall at
the National Cross Country
Championships and continues to
excel in Biathle.

Our <u>Chess</u> team, led by Captain, Robyn Becker, has had a successful year, winning the National All Girls' Competition, and 1st Team members did well at Nationals, with Pei-Shan Wang (U18 ranked second), Tshegofatso Bixa (U16) and Megan Dove (U16) doing well at Nationals. Megan Dove also participated in the Online SA Junior Closed and was placed second in the U16 Division, and was selected to represent SA in Batumi, Georgia.

2023 was an exciting year with our first <u>Soccer</u> tour to participate in the Alexander Road Tournament and we hosted our own Women's Day Soccer Tournament. We thank Mr Bixa and Msamo Attorneys for the sponsorship of our team kit.

Rowers participated in the Buffalo and Selborne Regattas with Amyoli Maganise, Sarah Jordan, Jessica van den Bosch, Zamazizi Pokwana, Grace Gibbons and Catherine Lutge winning medals. Our U15 Octuple took Gold at the SA Rowing champs. Special mention is made of Tanna Diplock. Tanna took part in the SA Senior Nationals as part of the EC Team, came 12th in the Senior Women's Single Sculls and won the U18 Sculls event. Tanna, who is visually impaired, has a passion and positivity for life and Rowing, which is inspirational.

Sporting history was made when we had our first provincial Rugby representative when Emma Bedser was selected for the Border U18 team to participate in the Inter-provincial Youth Week held at Jeppe Boys' High.

We thank our Head of Culture, Ms Kobus for ensuring a

magical Cultural year.

The Sister Act! show, deserves a second mention. The girls and staff who took the lead roles, Leanne Fletcher and Lihle Ndzwaiba, Mesdames Daines our Head of Drama: Wiseman -Head of Music, and Kobus, Head of Culture, deserve our hearty congratulations.

We hosted the ATKV regional round of the National Choral Competition with both our choirs participating. Our Chamber Choir received a Gold Award in the Prestige High School girls' category.

At this stage of my report I ask this Chamber Choir, De Novo Serenata, to perform "Rise Up" by Andra Day.

What an appropriate message in this song - of encouragement and lifting each other up – what our sisterhood at Clarendon is all about and a wonderful showcase of our talented musicians. This choir also placed First in their Section and First Overall, out of 22 Choirs, at the Cantamus National Choral Festival.

At the Port Rex Lions Music Eisteddfod, Lisakhanya Ganga received the Medal and Special Mention for Most Promising Woodwind player, while our Recorder Ensemble won the Best High School Instrumental Ensemble Medal. We earned 23 Golds, 30 Silvers and 11 Bronzes. 19 music students took part in the South African Society of Music Teachers' Competition in Ggeberha. Emma Pope, Bandile Ntini & Caitlin Higgs (Vocal Duet); Emma Pope, Carlyn Sauls and Jenna Botha (Classical Guitar Trio); Piano Duet of Amita Kumar and Sarah Jordan; and recorder player Lisakhanya Ganqa went through to the Finals, with Emma being placed third and Amita and Sarah placed second in their respective categories.

Our Classic Pan Group and the Intermediate Steel Drum Band entertained us at home Derby Days. Classic Pan with four staff members, won the Open Online Category in the Education Africa

International Marimba and Steel Pan Festival, winning the Trinidad and Tobago High Commission Trophy for Best Steelpan Band.

We continue to do well in all SA Council of English Educators' activities, with Clarendon winning the overall SACEE Trophy in November 2022 and hosting the Forum Discussion Competition.

Clarendon girls continue to show talent and commitment in Creative Writing. Maria Mortimer has had numerous works published and Sienna Nel was adjudged to be the winner of the Free-writing Prose Section at the National All Girls' Competition. 24 girls wrote the English Olympiad and we congratulate Gold Award winners, Rachel Webb and Khanyisa Mabula. Canzi Bizana was placed second in the inaugural Vrij and Karuna Harry Young Writers' Competition. A group of learners had the opportunity to attend the National Schools' Festival as part of the National Arts' Festival in Makhanda.

Let's Create has become a very popular co-curricular with Art. Drama and Crochet featuring. A wonderful Saturday celebration was held by Let's Create, which encouraged entrepreneurial spirt with food and Let's Create



stalls. The day was a success with Art Exhibitions, Debating, Public Speaking, Karaoke and the 12-hour Steel Drum Marathon highlights.

Christen Joubert and Emma-Jayne van Niekerk represented Clarendon at the All Girls' Festival, with Emma-Jayne receiving a certificate for the funkiest artwork. We congratulate the following on receiving Gold Awards and Double Gold Awards at the EL Art Eisteddfod: Gold: Ruvarashe George, Christen Joubert, Dominique Sedras: Double Gold: Tanna Diplock; Khanya Mdokwana, Lukonde Mwanza, and Julia Salamon. Khanya also had her work selected for the Umtiza Arts' Festival Exhibition.

32 of our learners took part in the combined Afrikaans. English and IsiXhosa Buffalo City Creative Arts Eisteddfod Drama Section winning 4 Bronze, 26 Silver, 19 Gold, 18 Double-Gold and 3 Triple-Gold awards.

Khanya Mdokwana (Original Verse and English Monologue) and Zenande Mgugo (IsiXhosa Imbongo) performed as Medal Winners at the Prizewinners' Concert.

We were delighted to host three exchange students at Clarendon this year: Hannah Kropp from Germany, Flurina Cisana from Switzerland and Tiziana Rodriguez Bosch from Argentina, contributing to our school's diversity and culture.

Many Clarendon girls continue to put Service before Self. Our 120 Bags of Hope initiative, as part of our 120th Birthday celebrations, was well supported by the school and well-received. Our Peer Tutors serve without recognition, giving up many hours per week. Their only reward is seeing their students improve academically. Our Magazine Photography Club led by Mrs Haschick are present at all events, come rain or shine. Special thanks go to Jocelyn Hodgkinson and Gaby Moulang for their loyal service to the Club

since Grade 8.

Our SCA, headed by Kaylin Hendriks, was active and made generous donations to Masimanyane Women's Shelter.

Our Enviro Club, has had an active year, the highlight being three river assessments, analysing water samples at Abbotsford causeway.

Interact has continued to do good work, supporting many initiatives this year, with the Valentine's Day Dance and our participation in the 12-hour Cancer Relay for Life, ever popular.

Our quarterly Blood Drives remain well supported and we are close to reaching our annual goal of 100 units.

One of our schools strengths, is our Old Girls' Community, and how their varied achievements inspire our current girls. The UP graduation statistics are certainly inspirational, as between 2020 and 2023, 60 Clarendon Old Girls graduated, more specifically, five with an MBChB, and six B. Veterinary

Science graduates. I thank Mrs Barbi Harrison, our Old Girls' Guild Chairlady, for all her hard work in keeping our girls connected for life.

Another strength is that we stand together as a family of schools. I thank Mr Bisschoff and Mr Dewar, Principals of Selborne Primary and College respectively, and Mr Albasini and Mrs Wrede, our Clarendon sister schools' Principals for their support. The latter two, in particular, have played key roles, as we have sought to consolidate our Clarendon brand and campus.

Our school is also blessed with a parent body who support our school and their daughters. Thank you to all parents and especially Grade 12 parents who have supported many events over the last 5 years.

We thank our Events' Coordinator, Mrs Sharyn Renton, and all parents who supported her, for their hard work at all our events in 2023, especially at Derby Days, on Founders' Day and this evening.




